About the Redesigned SAT

- Score Highlights
 - ▶ The SAT will have a 400- to 1600-point score scale.
 - Scores for the Essay section will be reported separately.
 - ► The redesigned exam will give credit for every correct response but will not deduct points for incorrect answers (rights-only scoring).
 - ► Rich score reports will provide a more detailed view of student achievement in specific skills.





Major Changes to the Exam

- The redesigned SAT will make it easier for students to show their best work.
 - More closely aligned to class work so students are prepared by their daily practice

- Percentage of scores 3 or higher: 69.0

AP® Exams

AP Exams are administered by schools worldwide on set dates in May each year.

- Exams are typically 2–3 hours and include:
 - Multiple-choice questions
 - Free-response items such as essays, problem solving, document-based questions and oral response
- The exam fee for 2017 is \$99 per exam.

AP® Myths & Realities

Myth	Reality
AP courses are for students who always get good grades.	AP courses are for any students who are academically prepared and motivated to take college-level courses.
AP courses are too stressful.	It's no secret that AP courses are challenging. But the support you receive from your classmates and teachers can help you manage the work load.
I don't think I will score high enough on the AP Exam to get college credit.	You don't need to score a 5. Many colleges grant credit — and placement as well — based on a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.
Taking AP courses could hurt my GPA.	AP courses earn an extra point towards GPA. Taking AP courses shows colleges that you're willing to challenge yourself academically.
I can't take AP because no one has recommended me.	If you think you're ready to take an AP course, then you're ready to advocate for yourself — just talk to a teacher or counselor.
