# The Community

Hartland is a community of approximately 27,000 people located in Livingston County. Hartland is located approximately 60 miles northwest of Detroit, 40 miles east of Lansing and 25 miles south of Flint. #### Curriculum

Hartland High School is a college preparatory program which incorporates career educational pathways into the individual student education plan. An applied technology program which offers a multitude of job skill training situations is available to those students interested in career and technical education. Honors and Advanced Placement courses are available through: Honors Geometry, Honors Algebra II and Trigonometry, Honors English 9, Honors English 10, Honors American History, Honors Chemistry, Honors Physics, Spanish I-V Honors, French I-V Honors, German I-V Honors, and American Sign Language III Honors. College credits are possible through A.P. Biology, A.P. Chemistry, A.P. Physics I, A.P. Physics C, A.P. Calculus AB, A.P. Calculus BC, A.P. Statistics, A.P. Language and Composition, A.P. Literature and Composition, A.P. European History, A.P. Psychology, AP United States History, A.P. US Government & Politics, A.P. Computer Science Principles, A.P. Computer Science A, and AP Spanish.

\*Due to ongoing curriculum changes, not all graduating classes have had the same Honors and A.P. course offerings available to them.

### Dual-Enrollment Arrangement with the University of Michigan-Flint

Hartland High School partners with the University of Michigan-Flint to offer advanced-level multi-course dual enrollment sequences for qualified & motivated students interested in the fields of Medical Science, Business/Economics, or General Studies. This initiative is titled the Dual Enrollment Educational Partnership, or DEEP, program. Participating DEEP students enroll in four UM-Flint courses, two each semester. Courses are taught by regular University of Michigan-Flint faculty members. All courses taught under this arrangement are selected from the university's current course catalog and adhere strictly to the University's customary content and student performance expectations.

The University of Michigan-Ann Arbor has formally recognized UM-Flint's DEEP program. Courses completed by DEEP students are transferable to UM-AA pursuant to the same performance and other guidelines governing transfer of any regular UM-Flint coursework to Ann Arbor. (Most UM-Flint courses transfer to UM-AA.) DEEP program completers are issued official UM-Flint transcripts. These courses also appear on the Hartland High School transcript and are noted as UM-Flint DEEP and Name of Program.

# **COVID-19 Statement**

As a result of the statewide school closure in March 2020 due to Covid-19, all Hartland High School students' grades were converted to Pass/Fail as a means to ensure equitable opportunities for all students. Regardless of whether credit was earned (PCV) or not (FCV), student GPAs were not impacted. GPAs for the Class of 2022 will not include second semester of tenth grade. Students who were not passing as of March 12, 2020 were given the opportunity to complete work and earn the PCV credit. Those who were passing as of the closure date automatically received PCV credit and were encouraged to continue participating in the academic enrichment opportunities provided by their teachers for the remainder of the semester.
